Nehemiah 2:6-2:20

Nehemiah was given permission by King Artaxerxes to go to Jerusalem and rebuild the walls of the city. They agreed on a time for Nehemiah to leave and return to the king. The king gave Nehemiah letters to the governors of other lands showing he had the king's permission to rebuild. He also gave Nehemiah building material and sent some soldiers with Nehemiah.

Nehemiah made the trip to Israel, and when he had been in Jerusalem three days he went out in the night and took a tour of the walls. He saw the broken-down walls and the gates, which had been burned. After Nehemiah viewed the damaged city, he met with the people of the city saying, "...come and let us build up the wall of Jerusalem..." (Nehemiah 2:17). Nehemiah told the people God was with them and He would bless them. He also told the people they had the king's permission. The people responded by saying, "Let us rise up and build" (Nehemiah 2:18).

Their enemies made fun of the Jews. They even accused the Jews of rebelling against King Artaxerxes. Nehemiah and the Israelite people did not let these spiteful neighbors stop them from rebuilding the city.

Nehemiah 2:6-2:20

Nehemiah was given permission by King Artaxerxes to go to Jerusalem and rebuild the walls of the city. They agreed on a time for Nehemiah to leave and return to the king. Nehemiah asked for letters from the king to show governors of other lands. This would prove Nehemiah had the king's permission to travel and work in Jerusalem. Nehemiah also asked the king to provide timber from his forest to rebuild Jerusalem's walls. The king gave Nehemiah everything he asked for and sent some soldiers with Nehemiah. God was working through the king.

Nehemiah made the trip to Israel. When Nehemiah presented the king's letters to the governors in the region around Jerusalem they were not happy. People in the area around Jerusalem did not want the Israelites to succeed in making their city great again.

At first, Nehemiah did not tell the people of Jerusalem why he had come. When he had been in Jerusalem three days he went out during the night and took a tour of the walls. He saw the broken down walls and the gates, which had been burned.



After Nehemiah viewed the damaged city, he met with the people of the city. He explained why he was there, saying, "...come and let us build up the wall of Jerusalem..." (Nehemiah 2:17). Nehemiah told the people God was with them and He would bless them. He also told the people they had the king's permission. The people responded by saying, "Let us rise up and build" (Nehemiah 2:18).

There were enemies in the area who laughed at the Jews when they heard about their building project. The enemies made fun of the Jews. They even accused the Jews of rebelling against King Artaxerxes. Nehemiah and the Israelite people did not let these spiteful neighbors stop them from rebuilding the city.

Did You Know?

Many of the cities in Bible times had walls around them for protection. In the walls were gates. Sometimes a city's gates were decorated with beautiful carvings. The gates could be locked and shut tight at night and in times of danger. The city of Jerusalem had many gates. Some are named in Nehemiah 2 and 3. The gates were named so they could be identified, a sort of address. There was the sheep gate, the fish gate, the fountain gate, and the valley gate, to name a few. There was even a dung gate. Can you guess what the gates were used for by their names? The sheep gate was used for sheep to come into the city. Sheep were used in sacrifices. The fish gate could have been named for the fishermen who brought their fish through this gate to sell. The dung gate would have been the gate used to take garbage out of the city. There were other gates. Read Nehemiah 2 and 3 to find the names of more gates.


God was with Nehemiah and the Israelite people just like he was with David when he fought Goliath. He is with you too!
